Carla "KC" Hanson - Candidate for Chair

Self-Identified Gender: Female Candidate Statement:

Last year was tragic, yet through the devastation, Oregon Democrats rose up to meet the challenge.

During the pandemic 2700 Neighborhood Leaders contacted 185,000 voters. Counties and Caucuses ran phone banks, sent GOTV postcards and dropped slate cards. The Local Elections Project and Leadership Retreat saw record online turnout, and DPO staff ran non-stop Zoom trainings.



Together, we won back the Secretary of State's office, repelled an attack on Rep. Defazio, and defended our logislative majorities. That Piden (Harris and Sep. Morl

legislative majorities. That Biden/Harris and Sen. Merkley won so handily is a point of pride and strength.

In the next 2 years we must back the critical work of the Racial Equity, Accountability and Leadership Committee, increase support for rural & frontier Democrats, re-elect Sen. Wyden, elect a Democrat to the open Governor's seat and elect Democrats up and down the ballot.

Our work is essential, and I ask for the honor of your support on March 20, and every day as we work together as proud Oregon Democrats

That's why the Committee appointments I've made reflect the wide diversity of our party, why I created the Racial Equity, Accountability and Leadership (R.E.A.L.) Committee, and why the R.E.A.L. Committee must continue its work to ensure that DPO becomes more diverse at every level.

2. What concrete steps will you take to support and elect Democrats in rural areas? Specifically, what should the DPO do in rural districts to further invest in recruiting candidates up and down the ticket, and to reach voters?

As Chair, I've prioritized DPO programs critical to rural County Parties working to elect local Democrats. Programs we must invest in include the Local Elections Project, Neighborhood Leader Program, Voter File access, Check for Democracy Grants, Fundraising Training, and communications support for local campaigns.

The DPO Candidate Bootcamp is a perfect example - providing a virtual Candidate 101 training just in time for May's elections.

But even with resources just a keystroke away, doing democracy in a red county can be a lonely endeavor. As Chair, I've committed to working with rural counties and to connecting them with each other. Sharing rural challenges and best practices allows us to support each other, sparks innovations, and will help us earn more wins every election.

As Democrats we share core beliefs in building a just society; as passionate Democrats it's not surprising we sometimes disagree on how we reach our goals. And healthy debate often builds the best policies. But our debates and interactions must be civil, respectful, and built on a common belief in our unifying values.

As Chair, I secured a Conflict Manager to train us on ways to resolve disputes, established a Code of Conduct Committee (CCC) to draft guidelines to help us work together, and worked for new ways to make our meetings run better during Covid19. In 2021-2022 we must make the CCC's recommendations a reality, provide more training on conflict management, and create more opportunities to work together and talk together with respect.



Propose a Special Committee to develop recommendations for supporting our County Parties' efforts in smaller and rural communities, including NAV outreach, sharing resources, volunteers, fundraising, IT help, and campaign support.

Facilitate County to County collaboration, relationship building to bridge rural-urban divide.

Form a group of Democratic elected officials and former candidates in rural communities to provide mentoring and support for candidates and campaigns.

Recruit Democratic Legislators to visit our rural County communities, and act as their Representatives in Salem.

Build relationships with state and local elected Democrats to encourage more collaboration with the SCC and its Caucuses.

All to break down conservative dominance in rural communities, counter Timber Unity, win local elections, and build a rural bench.

Self-Identified Gender: Female Candidate Statement:

I bring a wealth of leadership experience and diversity expertise to the position of Vice Chair. We need both of these qualifications to best represent our people and to elect Democrats across the state. My volunteer work began in 2008 with the Washington County Dems as a House District Leader (HDL), recruiting and supporting other PCPs, with a focus on BIPOC communities. As HDL, I went on to join the DPO's 2012 Citizens Involvement Committee. Our committee reached out into each of our Congressional Districts to train and advocate for National Convention delegates, which



resulted in one of the most diverse DNC delegations in Oregon history. Since then, I've served as Chair of the WashCoDems and DPO Black Caucus, and successfully chaired a number of committees in the DPO. Years of community and party activism have taught me that we need to seek input from ALL members, amplifying and valuing diverse, unheard voices. We can do this. Democrats can win! I am honored to ask for your vote.

Candidate Questions:

1. What does equity mean to you and how does it influence your leadership decisions? What steps will you take to increase representation of historically underrepresented and disenfranchised communities and build equity within the Democratic Party of Oregon?

Equity means fairness and justice. Equity requires recognizing that we don't all start at an equal place and change is necessary to mitigate imbalances. To be achieved and sustained, equity must be understood as a "structural and systemic concept." This understanding influences my leadership decisions. To build equity, I will implement equity tools such as: 1) A "racial equity lens" to analyze individual and group behavior for inclusion or bias in documents and practices. For example, in bylaws, conducting meetings, appointing chairs, using technology; 2) A resolution to strengthen the voices of the underrepresented by increasing the number of SCC delegates for Identity caucuses from one to three; and 3) A collaboration with community organizations who have developed best practices for building and sustaining equity.

2. What concrete steps will you take to support and elect Democrats in rural areas? Specifically, what should the DPO do in rural districts to further invest in recruiting candidates up and down the ticket, and to reach voters?

My response to this question is based on outreach to Democrats who actually "live in rural districts." I don't have the same lived experience as my rural friends, so in lieu of lived experience, I bring open ears and the same values of compassion and interest in community concerns that I bring to supporting all underrepresented communities.

First and foremost, DPO leadership must LISTEN to rural voices to build a trusting, effective communication network. We must also consider how poverty affects elections in rural districts. Financial support, such as funding Internet services for Democratic activists in rural areas, is key to effective electoral organizing. We must also do more to strengthen Neighborhood leader programs, and provide local parties with more signage and supplies.

3. The Democratic Party of Oregon draws our strength from our diversity – both of the people who make up our Party, and of the ideas and interests they bring to the discussion. But we can sometimes disagree on how we should achieve our shared goals. As a Party Officer, how do you plan to promote unity and build trust among the various groups and coalitions within our Party, even when they might disagree?

My leadership experience teaches me that we build trust relationships through constant engagement. If elected, I pledge to attend and engage in as many central committees and CD/caucus meetings as invited into. This participation is an important opportunity to listen, take questions, and be a conduit between DPO leadership and local Democrats. This level of involvement and transparency is integral to promoting unity and building trust. As Vice Chair, I will recommend implementing a "Unity Commission"—an ongoing, facilitated process, led by professionals from outside the DPO. Their charge will be to identify and engage the various coalitions within our Party, with a focus on areas/issues that divide rather than unite us. Facilitators should have diverse and culturally responsive ways to resolve disagreements.

Keith Haxton - Candidate for Vice Chair

Self-Identified Gender: Non-Binary Candidate Statement:

I'm asking for your vote because our party vitally needs progressive and democratic reform on the most fundamental level. Our party is meant to represent the broad interests of more than one million voters, not the interests of a small group of established party insiders. The representative democracy that our state central committee was meant to be has been eroded to the point that it hardly functions, often silences delegates and the communities we represent and often contradicts what our one million party members actually desire. If you elect me I will use the position to



ensure our party's diverse voices are heard and included, even when I disagree with them. I will do my best to ensure that our members are served by the party and that personal bias doesn't obstruct progressive reform nor the deliberative process. I will use the position to hold our elected officials accountable, to increase transparency in our party, and to bring genuine democracy to all of our party's committees.

Candidate Questions:

1. What does equity mean to you and how does it influence your leadership decisions? What steps will you take to increase representation of historically underrepresented and disenfranchised communities and build equity within the Democratic Party of Oregon?

Equity is justice. As the first openly non-binary SCC delegate, as a queer working class disabled veteran from rural Florida who has been homeless and works a low wage job, I know a little bit about disenfranchisement. I got started in politics fighting against the criminalization of homelessness in southern Oregon, which impacts the most marginalized communities. Our party likes to harp about including diverse voices and communities of color, but my and my partner's experience has shown me those voices are only welcomed when they support the party establishment. As vice chair I would change that by advocating for programs that help the most marginalized be able to attend our meetings, which would include offering interpreting services, childcare and reimbursement for travel costs.

2. What concrete steps will you take to support and elect Democrats in rural areas? Specifically, what should the DPO do in rural districts to further invest in recruiting candidates up and down the ticket, and to reach voters?

As a person who has spent most of my life in rural areas, I think the best thing our party can do to bridge the divide between rural and urban Oregonians is to stop believing the lies that the GOP spreads about what rural communities want. This problem shows itself prominently in our state's minimum wage, which is lower outside of the Portland Metro, and even lower for rural Oregonians. Discriminatory

policies that are based on a faulty neoliberal philosophy and which are championed by our party, like our unique three-tiered minimum wage, lay at the root of both the poor treatment of rural communities by our party, and those communities' justified resentment of us. Approving HB 3351 would help rectify this specific issue.

3. The Democratic Party of Oregon draws our strength from our diversity – both of the people who make up our Party, and of the ideas and interests they bring to the discussion. But we can sometimes disagree on how we should achieve our shared goals. As a Party Officer, how do you plan to promote unity and build trust among the various groups and coalitions within our Party, even when they might disagree?

I find that genuine unity in our party can and will only come about with genuine democracy. In so far as unity is possible within our body, I firmly believe that it can only arise when we have a fair and democratic decision-making process, which we currently lack in our central, executive and standing committees. In late 2019 I worked with officers and other SCC delegates for months to develop a proposal for a Unity and Reform Commission for the Democratic Party of Oregon. Although that resolution was submitted to the chair and then killed in the Rules Committee, I believe it was and still could be a good starting point for achieving unity in our party by way of democratic discussion and reform.

Self-Identified Gender: Male Candidate Statement:

I started life as a Republican and then worked at Enron. Seeing the corruption and greed sickened me - and that changed me and changed my life. People were patient with me and knowing I was heard and welcomed created a deep sense of compassion within me. It made me a better person and made me want to serve - to help others and do the work to make my community a better place for all. I volunteered for Obama in 2008, Bernie in 2016 and many campaigns along the way.



As a bridge builder, I believe in the value of our fellow human beings and building a strong team. As a DPO Vice Chair, I've learned that being an officer in this party is hard work and in a way like being an elected to public office. We have a limited budget and resources and we have a critical job to do. Fortunately, we have great County and Caucus leaders, Neighborhood Leaders, DPO staff, and support from a massive volunteer team of Democrats. That team is critical to electing Democrats in 2022 and beyond!

1. What does equity mean to you and how does it influence your leadership decisions? What steps will you take to increase representation of historically underrepresented and disenfranchised communities and build equity within the Democratic Party of Oregon?

Black, brown, and indigenous communities experience astounding levels of inequity. We need to listen better, ask "what do you need" and support them and their empowerment. I learnt through working on JoAnn Hardesty's campaign that we build connections by showing up, speaking little, and listening. I cannot walk in and tell someone what I think they need. That doesn't respect their experiences or struggles. We build connections when we show up and listen to what people say about their lived experiences, honoring the gift of their time, their struggles, and the hopes of what they want to do. This is how we build trust with marginalized communities and how we build concrete plans for equity.

2. What concrete steps will you take to support and elect Democrats in rural areas? Specifically, what should the DPO do in rural districts to further invest in recruiting candidates up and down the ticket, and to reach voters?

Knocking on doors for Jamie McLeod-Skinner taught me that every rural and frontier community has different needs. For rural and frontier Democrats I know at times your mission and work might seem an almost insurmountable task. With few resources you have to recruit, identify, and train candidates to run within your counties and

your neighborhoods. We must support your efforts to organize, activate, mobilize, and win - with great training through the Local Elections Project, by supporting your Neighborhood Leaders Programs, and investing in rural efforts statewide to build the Democratic team.
